T U R N U R E

The surname TURNURE was originally TOURNEUR and is of Picard or French origin. Some etymologists hold that the name was originally TOURNOIRE, meaning "black tower," a connection by which perhaps some well known landmark endowed the ancestral family with its name. Another possible origin is the term "tourneur," Norman French for one who took part in a tournament.

The TOURNEURs or TURNUREs of New York were one of some thirty French families, about a third of whom were from Picardy, who made their home in Harlem in the seventeenth century. Of Picard descent were the TOURNEURS, CRESSONS, DEMARESTS, CASIERS and DISOSWAYS, members of which all, except the last, served as magistrates. The TOURNEUR family has always played an influential part in the history of state and nation. Some of its members have been men of the highest repute in public, professional and commercial life.¹

Daniel Tourneur or DeTourneur, as his name was sometimes written, the ancestor of most Americans bearing the name or one of its variations (Tenure, Tenuer, Turneure, sometimes Turner, and Turnure), was born at Amiens, in Picardy, France in 1625, of an ancient French family whose members were once barons of Tours. As a Huguenot, he left Picardy in the early seventeenth century to escape religious persecution, settling in Leyden, Holland. Here he established himself as a draper and, on 5 September 1650, married Jacqueline de Parisis, born c1620 of a Walloon family from Hesdin, in Artois, and sister to the Reverend Eustacius de Parisis, then of Amsterdam. Nearly two years later, on 4 April 1652, Daniel, his wife, and infant son Daniel, sailed from Holland for New Netherland. He was probably in the company of Dominie Samuel Drisius, of Leyden, and was accompanied by his kinsmen Jean LeRoy and wife, Louise de Lancaster.

Arriving in America, Tourneur first lived at what is now Flatbush, where he served as corporal of a company formed 7 April 1654 for protection against marauders. Soon after, he was granted a corner lot in New Amsterdam with a view to putting up a house; but a year or more passed before the timber was ready and he renewed his request 11 April 1657, probably without success. He later built a house on Prince's Graft, where he had bought a lot 31 May 1660. On 16 August of the same year he was appointed magistrate for Harlem. The following winter he erected a barn on the village plot at Harlem, where he had already built a house, into which he soon moved. He served as a magistrate at various periods and, for several years, as deputy sheriff. He was repeatedly chosen deacon and was a delegate to the General Assembly of 1664, as well as being one of Nicolls Patentees.²

Daniel was a man of high spirit who, according to old records, lost his temper magnificently when reminded that the proximate cause of his emigration had been judged a homicide! The story is that while attending the funeral of a Huguenot friend in his native town of Amiens, he denied the King's command to stop a Protestant service; and, when an arrest was attempted by the officer of the guard, he drew his rapier, killed the officer, and put the soldiers to flight.³

Harlem was originally a village on Manhattan Island, now the local name for that part of the borough of Manhattan in New York City beginning at 106th Street and extending north between the East and the Harlem Rivers and Eighth Avenue. Its settlement on the site of what is now Mount Morris Park dates from 1636. In 1658 Peter Stuyvesant named the village New Haarlem, after Haarlem, the town in Holland from where many of its inhabitants came. The old village is charmingly described by Washington Irving in his "Knickerbocker's History of New York." Harlem retained its quiet, rural aspect until 1836, when daily commuting to New York City by horse railroad was established, after which time, by degrees, it became a populous suburb and finally a densely built-up residential section of the metropolis. The name now refers more specifically to the district north of 125th Street which, in the 1920s, became the most populous urban Negro community in the world.⁴

The Tourneurs had been victims of repeated persecution in France and were driven from home in the fruitful valley of the Somme in the wake of a relentless war. Subsequent incidents indicated that their flight was not unaccompanied by violence. In fact, Daniel Tourneur fled Amiens after repeated accusations of having killed a man, although it was known that he only acted in self defense.

Daniel Tourneur was an under-sheriff when Jan Nagel wrote his remarkable protest to Mr. Verveelen. Tourneur recommended that the offender "be bound over to the mayor's court as a rebel, on the charge of having refused to obey the charge of the constable." So many were involved in the discussion and so numerous were Nagel's sympathizers, that Nelis Matthyseen, a former magistrate, was asked to take the bench. Tourneur protested, shouting "Nelis is a rebel." Thereupon, Matthyseen challenged Tourneur to prove his accusation, which he apparently did, since Matthyseen was fined \$2.40 and the cost of the suit. From this time forward, Tourneur appears as champion of the town in a variety of disputes. In 1669 he fought for the preservation of the Spuyten Duyvil and Westchester meadows. In the same year he was summoned, as magistrate, to appraise the effects of Delavall's miller, Hage Bruynsen. Later that year he was also appointed, along with Resolved Waldron, to see New York and Harlem connected by a suitable roadway at the earliest possible moment. About this time Tourneur's negro ran away, an affair which caused concern even in the executive mansion. "Whereas" read Governor Lovelace's proclamation, "there is lately a negro servant run away from his

master's service and supposed to be gone your way toward New England, these are to require all persons within their government and to desire all others, if the said negro can be found within your liberties or precincts, that you forthwith seize upon and secure him, and cause him to be safely conveyed to this place, or to his master, Daniel Tourneur, at Harlem, upon this island. The negro is big and tall, about 25 or 26 years old, and went away from his master four or five days since. Given under my hand at Fort James in New York, this 28th day of June, 1669. Francis Lovelace."⁵

In 1667, in addition to being a "sworn butcher," Tourneur, together with Resolved Waldron, was appointed "brander" for the town for the purpose of branding all cattle so that the villagers could be made responsible for strays. His other appointments, taken from a list of Town Officers, were: Schepen, appointed 16 August 1660, 3 November 1661, and 17 November 1663; magistrate, 17 June 1665; deputy sheriff, 1665-1670; and overseer, 7 February 1671.

The details of Daniel's acquisition of his sizable fortune may never be known; but town records indicate his continued and ever-increasing prosperity. For example, there was a matter brought to the town's attention by Resolved Waldron stating that the village owed Tourneur 73 florins 16 stivers, a sum then equal to about \$30 and representing "a good many days' labor.

Mentioned in almost every town event of importance for the next two years, Tourneur's life closed after a remarkably successful career. James Riker says of him that he was "a man of generous instincts and of great energy, and to his tact and abilities the town owed much of its success."⁶

He died in 1690 according to James Riker in "History of Harlem."

2-4 Jacques TOURNEUR was born about 1655 in Harlem, New York. He married first on 17 June 1683, Aefie KORTRIGHT, daughter of Michael KORTRIGHT and _____, and had seven children. He married second, on 29 May 1714, Engeltie VanDYCK, daughter of Thomas VanDYCK and Maritie ANDRIES, and widow of Gregoris STORM of Philips Manor, New York. Jacques served as deacon, and also as a constable (appointed 29 Sep 1692) and overseer of the town (appointed 29 Sep 1699, 29 Sep 1700) succeeding, in 1691, to that part of his father's lands on VanKeulen's Hook known as lots 17 & 18 (but in quantity known as three lots), and since then known as the Bussing or Storm farm. On 7 Aug 1691 he bought from Peter Van OBLIENIS, for 60 guilders, the old Jacques CRESSON residence, which became his home. On 27 May 1698 he sold his lot number 7, of the draft of 1691, to Johannes MYER. His death is not recorded, but his farm and lots in the several divisions, in all 60 acres, were sold to Peter BUSSING in 1726.⁸

Frederick was born about 1645 in Festubert, Province of Artois, France.¹² He was a Huguenot who came from Mannheim, Germany in 1675 and settled at New Harlem, New York. He died November of 1743, probably in Yonkers, New York.¹³ Esther died about 1721.

2-8 Thomas TOURNEUR was born about 1665 in Harlem, New York, and died about 1 March 1716, possibly at New Castle County in Delaware as his will was recorded 25 July 1709 in Will Book C, Folio 35, p. 326, Wilmington, Delaware.¹⁶ The will was probated 28 March 1716. On 5 April 1692 Thomas married Maria Van OBLINUS, daughter of Joost Van OBLINUS and Maria SAMMIS, in the New York Dutch Reformed Church.

Thomas came into possession of his share of the paternal lands, embracing lots No. 19 Van Keulen's Hook and No. 1 Jochem Pieters, with the adjoining "orchard," of one morgen lot, reaching from the latter down to the Church Lane, and on which stood the house and barn. The out-gardens, Nos. 1 to 4, also fell to his share; and prior to 1701 he became owner of the Bosch or Bush farm, on the North River side.

Thomas seems to have inherited largely the tastes and spirit of his father. Besides filling lesser town offices, he was the alderman of the Out Ward in 1696-7. Appointed surveyor of highways 29 September 1707, he sided with the Harlem people in feeling aggrieved at being required by the mayor and aldermen to join in working the newly surveyed roads outside of the town's limits. Tourneur refused and was fined six shillings by Constable Sickles, who levied on his goods. In response Tourneur procured a writ of the Supreme Court and had the constable arrested for trespass. Since the mayor and aldermen resolved to defend the constable, the incident caused much excitement, but pleased the inhabitants, who the next year, 29 September 1708, made Tourneur constable. However, the city council, on the plea of his "having served in the office of alderman," declared him exempt and ordered a new election. On 29 September 1709, he was chosen town collector.¹⁷

Thomas Tourneur probably went to Delaware about 1710 as his son, Jacobus, is charged for back quit-rent in his stead, and that year all his lands were sold. His farm was bought by Capt. Jacob DeKey, and his Van Keulen Hook lot No. 1, etc., by Capt. Charles Congeve.

Why he went to Delaware has not been investigated at this time. However, it is known that all his children, except for Jacobus, grew up there. Jacobus stayed in the New York area.

Some observations by Robert F. Turnure, compiler:

By 1760 most all the TOURNEURS in the third generation of whom we have any record of descendants had left Harlem and settled in Orange County (now Rockland County), New York in the vicinity of Clarkstown, Haverstraw and Tappan. Woodhull (3-10) arrived about 1717 and his three sons were born there. Jacobus (3-16) was next to arrive, possibly soon after he was married in 1720. One source says his eldest son, Jacobus, was probably born in Haverstraw about 1722, although it isn't until 1736 that we find a record of the birth of a daughter, Sarah, in the Tappan records. Michael (3-15) did not settle in Haverstraw until much later, about 1758, and undoubtedly was accompanied by his two oldest sons: (1) Jacobus (4-47) who was married and had three sons by then (the births of the seven subsequent children being recorded in the Clarkstown records); and (2) Hendrick (4-53), whose children's births are also recorded in the Clarkstown records.²⁰

There may have been other TOURNEURS in and around New York City. Woodhull's brother, Daniel III, is known to have owned lands in Westchester County which he sold in 1727. It is not known where he went or if he had descendants. Nothing is known of Abraham (b. 1698) or Isaac (b. 1701), who were brothers of Michael and Jacobus, except that Isaac was living in Fordham in 1733.

In 1775, at the beginning of the Revolutionary War, we find the fourth generation reaching middle age and the fifth generation in their prime for military service. It appears that nearly every one served his country. In the publication "New York in the Revolution" we find listed on page 490 the following muster roll, Orange County:

The early service of the Revolutionary War was intermittent, enlistments being usually for a short time to cover an emergency. After service was over, the soldiers returned home until further necessity required the enlistment of an additional force. This accounts for the duplications in the lists and the name was frequently misspelled by others.

Some of the names are readily identified as belonging to members of the family as given in the genealogy; for instance, Lawrence, Michael and Woodhull. Others are not so easily identified. Capt. Henry TOURNEUR, or Hendrick TURNURE, was undoubtedly the Hendrick who succeeded to the homestead portion of the paternal farm. The Sergeant Henry was probably his cousin Hendrick (b. about 1724) who married in 1753 and whose children are unknown. It is very likely that the Private Henry was his son. The Johns (Johannis) and Jameses (Jacobuses) were too numerous to try to pinpoint but undoubtedly all those in the fifth generation served. There apparently were two Odles (Woodhulls) of whom we have no other knowledge. Then there was a Jacob TORNEUR and a Joshua TURNOR who may or may not have been members of the family. We have no record of any with those given names, although Jacob could be short for Jacobus.

The first U. S. Census was taken in 1790, but until 1850, information regarding name and age appears only for the heads of

families. The 1790 schedules have been indexed by states and published (1908). In the New York index the names TOURNEUR, TURNURE, TENURE do not appear. However, there are about 70 names under TURNER and eight under TENNUER.

These eight families are readily recognized as being TOURNEURs. However, we have records of others who should have been included, such as Michael, who married Geertje Blauvelt 15 June 1786 (Tappan records). His daughter Magritje was born 18 March 1790 (Clarkstown records). And where was Jacobus who was 34 years old and unmarried at the time but two years later married Elizabeth Secor 13 December 1792 (Tappan records)? Then there are John, Hendrick, Jacobus, David and Daniel. Undoubtedly some of these moved into nearby New Jersey. In "New Jersey in the Revolution" there a company from Bergen County is listed as having a Capt. Abraham J. Blauvelt, 1st Lt. Cornelius D. Blauvelt and ten privates whose last names were Blauvelt. As there were at least four marriages between TOURNEURs and BLAUVELTs, the two families must have been closely associated. We even find that Woodhull TURNEUR served both in New York and New Jersey (or were they two different men with the same name?). Unfortunately, the 1790 census records for New Jersey were destroyed during the War of 1812 and others are missing. The earliest census available for Bergen County is for the year 1830.

It is not known at this time where William's body ultimately rested.

He, too, was a Sandy Hook Pilot. He died 30 November 1885 at Nassau, Providence Island, Bahamas, according to probate records filed in New York City. Family tradition says he died of yellow fever and that the body was preserved in a glass lined casket filled with rum. It was through the glass lid of the casket that his son, Eben, identified the body when it was finally allowed to be returned to the United States. Apparently, the body was kept in quarantine in the Bahamas for about three years before being shipped back to this country for burial. It is presumed that he left New York harbor piloting a ship in bad weather and had to stay with it, which would explain why he happened to be in the Bahamas when he died. His home was in New York City.

7-245 John TURNEAURE was born 26 December 1804 in Cooperstown, Otsego County, New York. He married at Castile, Wyoming County, New York on 12 January 1826 Maria MABIE, daughter of Jacob MABIE and Mary TALLMAN. Maria was born 10 January 1806 in Delaware County, New York.⁹³

In 1831, John with his family and brother, Thomas, aged 15, left all relatives and moved to Crawford County, Pennsylvania. After a number of years there, John became interested in the "great, level, rich prairies extending west of Chicago as far as the eye could see, all ready for the plow." So he decided to try his fortune in the great west and sold his farm in the fall of 1842. He secured two pairs of horses and two wagons and prepared to move the following Spring. By now, he had eight children - four boys and four girls. Mary was the eldest at age fifteen and Harrison was the youngest at age three. On 18 April 1843 they set out for Illinois with all their worldly goods and \$42. It was thought at that time a great adventure for anyone to go a thousand miles into an almost unknown country. They traveled north to Gerard, then west through Cleveland and Toledo, Ohio, Adrian and Sturgis, Michigan, Elkhart, South Bend, and Michigan City, Indiana. Due to floods and washed out bridges, they had to travel from the Calumet River to Salt Creek over wet spring prairie, through sloughs, swamps and mud holes. That 40 mile trip, as Giles relates it, "was the most disagreeable task I ever encountered." After stopping for the last night of their journey, four miles west of Elgin, they arrived late the next day, 4 May 1843, at Daniel MABIE's place in Squaw Prairie on the banks of Poscassaw Creek. Aaron MABIE, who was married to John's sister, Amy, lived two miles away and Rescom MABIE lived on the big bottom of Rock River, six miles north of Rockford, Illinois.

John share-cropped that summer. His family of ten lived with Daniel MABIE's family of five in their log house of one room below and one above. In the fall of that year, they moved to the north side of the prairie into one half of a double log house owned by Mr. HALE, who lived in the other half. During the winter, John pre-empted 120 acres of land one mile south and four miles west of Belvidere. It was the only government land in Boone County. The price was \$1.25 per acre. After building a one room shanty 14 X 18 feet of oak lumber with the ends and backside sodded up, they moved

into it in April of 1844. Two years later, they built a larger home 18 X 26 feet, one and a half stories high, and moved into it in May of 1846.

In the fall of 1849, after repeated crop failures, John sold his farm and bought two Mexican War Soldiers' Government land warrants of 160 acres each for \$270. He started on horseback for Iowa to hunt for suitable government land. However, he was able to find two vacant quarter sections of "as good prairie land as there is anywhere, nine miles south of Freeport [in a town called Florence] and only 45 miles to move." John rented a farm of 160 acres five miles south of Freeport for two years until he could get started on his own land and build. All the family, except the two oldest girls, moved to this rented farm in the spring of 1850. The move proved to be a wise one, for with good crops and the coming of the railroad in 1853, they prospered. In 1855 John built a large stone house which still stands today.

As the children married, they settled nearby. The first permanent dispersion of the family came in 1866 when Jacob sold his farm and moved to Carterville, Missouri. Giles was the last to leave the town of Florence in 1891. In 1869, John sold out and removed to Clinton, Wisconsin accompanied by his two youngest sons, George and Peter. Harrison also sold and moved there at the same time. Albert followed the next year.

John TURNEAURE died 14 June 1879, aged 74 years, and is buried in Clinton, Wisconsin. All of his children attended the services. It was the last occasion they were all together. His widow survived him by ten years living with son, George, and returning to Freeport with him in 1883. She died 30 June 1889 in Milford, Dickinson County, Iowa, at the home of her son, Albert. Her body was taken to Clinton, Wisconsin to be buried by that of her husband in the family burying ground.⁹⁴

He went to Boone County, Illinois in 1842 where his brother, John, found him working for a Mr. CLINE, according to Giles' autobiography. This was undoubtedly Elihu CLINE, whose daughter, Marcia Louisa he married 27 January 1847. She was born 26 November 1828 to Elihu CLINE¹⁰⁴ and Phoebe LATHROP¹⁰⁵, who had come to Belvidere, Illinois in 1840 from Port Stanley, Ontario, Canada, where they had lived since 1832. Previous to that, this family lived in Whitehall, New York.

Loren was a carpenter by trade. After his marriage in 1847, they lived for a while on a farm in Winnebago County, Illinois, then went to Delevan, Wisconsin. Later, in 1857, they moved to Bristol, Worth County, Iowa, where their son, Frederick Ashton TURNURE was born in 1859. Loren kept a livery stable and ran a hotel there. He also was the County Sheriff.

In 1864, the family went back to Boone County, Illinois to the old CLINE farm as Mr. CLINE was unable to farm any longer. The farm included forty acres that Loren had bought in 1851 from Polly WAKEFIELD for \$220. One hundred years later it was worth \$9000!

Loren died 30 October 1874 aged 52 years. His widow survived him 28 years. She died 25 February 1902. They are buried in the Guilford Union Cemetery on the Spring Creek Road in Winnebago County, Illinois, as are the CLINES and the LATHROPS.

After the wedding, they moved into a two room log house that Giles had built one-half mile from his father's place, on eighty acres which his father had given him. In the fall of 1855 they moved in with his father, John, when he had completed a large stone house. A year later, they moved into their new house out on the prairie, one mile from John's place and three miles from Florence Station. Here they lived for about ten years until the Spring of 1865 when Giles sold to Andrew Black and bought his father-in-law's farm three miles away and three miles nearer Freeport. This is probably the 80 acres he was listed as owning in Sec. 17, Florence Town, in 1880. In December of 1890 he rented the farm out and moved to Freeport where he spent his remaining years. He was, for a number of years, Highway Commissioner and helped lay out and survey nearly all the highways in the town of Florence, south of Yellow Creek. Giles was also School Trustee, School Treasurer, Sunday School Teacher, Juror, and Justice of the Peace.

It is to Giles that we are indebted for much of the family history during the nineteenth century. In 1898 he wrote an autobiography of some 100 typewritten pages relating his experiences during those pioneer days. Giles died 1 November 1906 in Madison, WI and Sophronia died 24 April 1916.
